Legal Resources

Agencies and their staff cannot provide individuals advice about any specific path/paperwork they should complete with respect to their immigration status. This is considered unauthorized practice of immigration law. Clients should only seek legal advice from attorneys or individuals that specialize in immigration law.

- Department of Justice Accredited Representatives [this is a lower cost option – they are not lawyers, but they have passed a justice department test about immigration law].

- U.S. Immigration Office in Centennial (jurisdiction is all of CO and WY) offers appointments via an online scheduler to ask specific questions about what recourse is available for individual cases or information on a pending application. This service is available to everyone, including undocumented individuals. Currently there is no ICE enforcement at this location. Please note that U.S. immigration does NOT provide interpreters for anyone at these appointments, individuals must bring their own.
