Interest Groups

Much of AHA's work is accomplished through Interest Groups. Through these gatherings, AHA provides a setting, the information, and the connections that produce and nourish new approaches and collaborations that strengthen Aurora's healthcare system. Areas of focus for the Interest Groups are determined by community needs, member-identified priorities, and AHA's capacity to make a difference in that area. On AHA's website, you can find a page for each Interest Group, with a list of participants and a library of information.

Access to Specialty Care Interest Group Participants: 123 Individuals, 56 Organizations

This group is sponsored by UCHealth and focuses on understanding and addressing the barriers to accessing specialty care services.

Outputs:

Senior Circle

Participants: 319 Individuals, 166 Organizations

This group convenes individuals and organizations engaged with Aurora's older adults and works with and supports the Aurora Commission for Seniors.

Outputs:

- * Affordable Oral Health Services for Seniors Resource Guide
- **★** Nowhere to Go Project focused on vulnerable seniors stranded in emergency rooms

Kids Interest Group

Participants: 117 Individuals, 44 Organizations

This group focuses on building community-wide collaborations and strengthening the capacity of children's health initiatives. Refugee and immigrant communities are included and engaged in these efforts.

Outputs:

Social Determinants of Health Interest GroupParticipants: 94 Individuals, 35 Organizations

This group investigates and discusses social determinants of health such as childcare, transportation, food, and other factors that can impact health.

Outputs:

- * Community-wide promotion of EITC tax credits
- * Research on impact of mold on children with asthma



Quarterly Community Meetings

In January, April, July, and October, AHA holds community meetings to report to and hear from our membership. Meetings are hosted by various community partners, and include education, networking, community announcements, and celebration.



Aurora Smiles

To celebrate **National Children's Oral Health Month** in February 2017, AHA convened organizations committed to providing oral health services to underserved and vulnerable kids. In collaboration with a variety of community partner hosts, we offered free dental screenings and fluoride varnish to more than 100 kids in northwest Aurora, and provided their families with information about how to find an affordable dental care home in Aurora.

The success of this outreach effort and awareness that there is significant unmet need for oral health education and services in Aurora, led to the creation of the Aurora Smiles Team. Several organizations in the public and private sector are collaborating to improve access to oral health in Aurora. In late 2018, AHA received a small three-year grant from the Delta Dental Foundation of Colorado to support the Aurora Smiles work. Projects being considered include outreach to oral health providers in Aurora to encourage them to apply sealants and working with Women Infant and Children's Program (WIC) to provide oral health education, referral, and services.



AHA 2018 Accomplishments, Events, and Milestones

- Held four Quarterly Community Meetings offering education in such topics as trauma-informed care, dental sealants, homelessness, immunizations, and balanced billing, with an average attendance of 72 people.
- Provided education, information, and networking opportunities through 27 Interest Group gatherings focused on Kids Health, Senior Resources, Access to Specialty Care, Coverage Expansion, and Social Determinants of Health.
- Coordinated a community-wide workshop, Nowhere to Go, that highlighted the plight of vulnerable seniors stranded in hospital emergency rooms. This workshop provided much of the groundwork for a three-part series on Channel 9 about the issue statewide.
- Hosted the 2018 Aurora Senior Forum, which attracted over 45 exhibitors and 275 attendees. The 2018
 Forum was co-hosted by the City of Aurora, the Aurora Commission for Seniors, and the Aurora Center for
 Active Adults.
- Conducted a demonstration project with RubiconMD and Doctors Care to show the positive impact econsults with specialty care physicians can have on improving access to primary care. The project was highlighted in an article in the Colorado Academy of Family Physician's April magazine.
- Grew our membership from 1,700 in December 2017, to over 2,200 December 2018!





In October, we asked our members to describe AHA. This word cloud captures their responses.






AHA 2018 Budget Snapshot
