

2020 Census Operational Adjustments Due to COVID-19

The 2020 Census Is underway and households across America are responding every day. In light of the COVID-19 outbreak, the U.S. Census Bureau has adjusted 2020 Census operations in order to:

- Protect the health and safety of Census Bureau employees and the American public.
- Implement guidance from federal, state, and local health authorities.
- Ensure a complete and accurate count of all communities.

The table below summarizes the adjustments to operations. Should any additional adjustment become necessary, the Census Bureau will promptly publish the change in an updated document.

Every 10 years, the United States counts everyone who lives in the country, from newborn babies to the oldest among us. It is important for everyone to complete the 2020 Census so that communities like yours can be accurately funded and represented.

Responding is important.

The 2020 Census will influence community funding and congressional representation for the next decade. Information collected in the census will inform the allocation of more than \$675 billion in federal funds for states and communities each year. That includes money for things like:

- > First responders
- Medicare Part B
- > Supportive Housing for
- Libraries and community centers
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- Senior Community Service Employment Program

Beginning in mid-March 2020, you can respond to the census online, by phone, or by mail. Choose the option that is most comfortable for you. Large-print guides to the questionnaire are available upon request. From May – July 2020, census takers will visit households that have not yet responded. A census taker can assist if you need help completing your form.

Stroke Statistics


Did you know?

- Leading cause of disability in the United States
- 5th leading cause of death
- 800,000 people experience stroke every year
- Happens every 40 seconds in the US
- 80% are preventable
- May is Stroke Awareness Month!



What is a Stroke?

- BRAIN ATTACK
- Interruption in normal blood flow to the brain causing brain damage
- Two Types
 - Ischemic
 - Hemorrhagic





Symptoms

- SUDDEN changes
 Balance
 - -Visual
 - -Speech
 - -Sensory
 - -Facial
 - -Limbs
- Never ignore symptoms
- Time is brain



KNOW THE SIGNS

- BALANCE : Sudden difficulty standing or walking.
- **EYES** : Sudden loss of vision or double vision.
- FACE : Uneven or drooping smile.
- **ARM** : One arm is weak.
- **SPEECH** : Slurred or jumbled speech.
- TIME TO CALL : Call your nurse if you suspect any symptoms.





Stroke Treatment Options at UCH

- Treatment for stroke is available <u>but is time-sensitive</u>
- Intravenous (IV) tPA
 - -Clot busting
 - -Given through an IV
 - -The earlier we can give it, the better the outcome
 - -Up to 4.5 hours from Last Known Well
- Interventional Radiology
 - -Clot retrieval device
 - -Clot suctioning device
 - -Available 24/7 at comprehensive stroke centers







How can you help?

- The number of people seeking emergency care for strokes (and other emergencies) has declined during COVID-19.
- We know that strokes and heart attacks are still happening!
- Because of time-limitations of treatment options, delaying care for stroke means a person may not be eligible for treatment.
- Help us educate the community that Stroke is an emergency and 911 should be called as soon as symptoms noticed.
